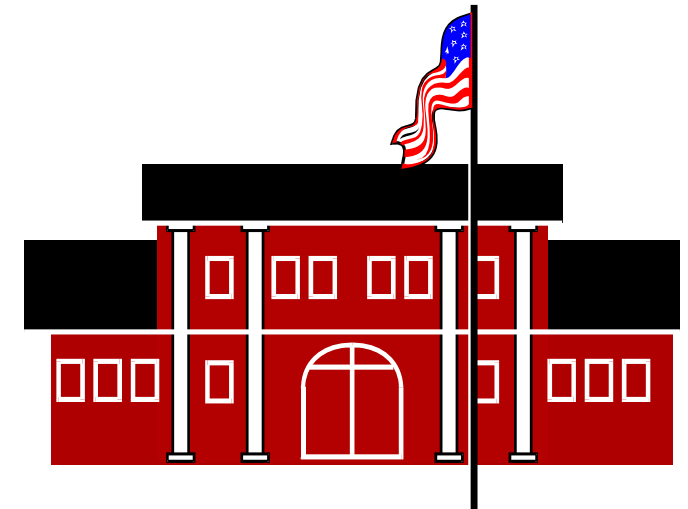

Special Education Services

The Lebanon School District offers a full range of special education programs for students with disabilities, ages three to 21 years. Special services may range from consultation with teachers, classroom support and resource rooms to full time special education classrooms. Additional services such as speech, occupational, and physical therapies or counseling are provided if necessary to enable a student to benefit from instruction. In accord with state and federal law requiring education in the least restrictive environment, students are removed from the regular education environment only when the nature or severity of the disability is such that education in regular classes with the use of supplementary resources and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily. - ◆ We provide consistency in educational programming for students in two K-4 schools. All Lebanon School District 5th and 6th graders attend school at Seminary Hill School. All buildings strive to be friendly and welcoming to students and their families. The curriculum provides a solid foundation in academic skills and knowledge, supplemented by many enrichment experiences. The staff gives individual attention to students to prepare them for entry to Lebanon Junior High.
- ◆ Both single grade and team-taught approaches are strategies for grades K-6. Specialists provide weekly instruction in art, music, and physical education. Instrumental music lessons begin in grade 5. Librarians and library assistants introduce students to new literature and teach them how to locate and use information. School counselors meet with classes and small groups to develop social and problem-solving skills and understanding of growth and development. All students learn to use the computer to access, organize, and report information as well as a tool for writing.
- ◆ Special programs and activities include: Reading, ELL support, Artists in the Schools, Hood Museum ArtStart and Images Programs, Spelling and Geography Bees, Four Winds Science, Talent Shows, Valley Quest, Partners in Health, service learning, assemblies/school sings, field trips, and guest speakers.
- ◆ Thousands of volunteer hours in and for our elementary schools are offered by our parents and friends each year.

- ◆ Lebanon Junior High has a middle school philosophy for students from Lebanon, Plainfield and Grantham. We view the junior high years as a time to reinforce and apply the basic skills for all students, plus a time to explore new opportunities.
- ◆ Students are organized into three interdisciplinary teams. All teams are supported by staff in guidance, health, art, music, p.e., family & consumer science, technology education, foreign language, library-media, and special education. Teams build academic and social skills through Unity Days, academic field trips, and special projects.
- ◆ Each team follows the same curriculum in science, social studies and language arts. Advanced math and Topics I are options for students with high ability, motivation, and achievement. All students take units in technology, family consumer science, music, art, physical education, study skills, and health/guidance during their two years at LJHS. They may explore or take Level I French or Spanish as a two year program. Band, instrumental and vocal ensembles, and chorus are additional music options. Students practice research and study skills in the library-media center where a computer lab also provides opportunities to use the computer as a tool for learning in all subject areas.
- ◆ Special attention is given to refining writing and study skills in preparation for high school. Teams work to provide opportunities for both remediation and acceleration, according to individual needs. A student assistance program is available to help students deal with the changes of adolescence and to prevent or intervene in the development of self-destructive behavior.
- ◆ Special opportunities for learning include interscholastic athletics, Art Club, Gymnastics Show, Math Team, music festivals, Solar Sprint, Quiz Bowl, community service, visiting artists, exhibitions, dances, and celebrations of learning.

- ◆ Lebanon High School offers a comprehensive high school program for students from Lebanon, Plainfield, and Grantham. The faculty is committed to establishing a dynamic environment devoted to excellence, the joy of learning, and the growth of the individual. Their goal is to graduate students who are informed, literate, compassionate, and committed to the preservation of a free society.
- ◆ In addition to the traditional requirements in English, math, science, and social studies, each graduate must complete courses in physical education and health; fine arts; and computer science. Strong college preparatory programs include accelerated, honors, and advanced placement courses in core academic departments.
- ◆ Along with a range of electives offered in the traditional disciplines, students may elect courses in business and information technology, computer programming and hardware, teen roles and consumer education, and technology education at LHS. Juniors and seniors may enroll in a half-day program at the Hartford Area Career and Technology Center. Programs range from Accounting and Culinary Arts to Public Safety and Videography.
- ◆ Students needing an accelerated academic program, enrichment, remedial, or special education services are accommodated through alternative course work including work experience/work study, independent study, alternative credit, individual tutoring, and small group instruction. Summer school courses enable motivated students to gain credit for courses failed the previous year.
- ◆ Students are encouraged to take advantage of co-curricular opportunities in drama, art, music, athletics, school publications, class boards and School Council, Math Team, AFS, Youth in Action, Robotics Team, Students for a Sustainable Future, and other clubs and activities.
- ◆ From 65 to 75% of our students take the SAT exam. In recent years, 70% of our students have pursued post-secondary education. Approximately 60% of our graduates enroll in four-year schools after gaining admission to a wide variety of colleges and universities located in all regions of the United States.
